FAFSA In 5 Steps

<u>Free Application</u> for Federal Student Aid should be completed even if your parents do not think you qualify because it lets the colleges know what state, federal or college-based aid you may be eligible for...

- -Grants
- -loans
- -Work study

It is important to complete it as soon after the Oct. 1 opening date since colleges have priority deadlines for the aid.

Step 1- Gather your material ahead of time. 2019 W2s, Tax forms, Social Security number, driver's license and financial forms such as bank statements.

Step 2-Get your FSAID and your parent, so you can sign and submit the FAFSA once completed www.fsaid.ed.gov

Step 3- Fill out the FAFSA – In the application use the previous or next button at the bottom of the page, make sure to use your exact name as seen on your Social Security card and use the IRS data retrieval tool to verify your tax information. www.fafsa.gov

Step 4- Review the summary at the end of the form then sign and submit the form.

Step 5-Follow Up- You will get the SAR within a week this is what the colleges you have listed on the FAFSA will receive and use to determine you aid.




DO I NEED TO FILE THE CSS PROFILE?

There are scholarships provided by governments, corporations, universities or any organization with goodwill willing to support education. Many scholarships come from stipulations in the wills of philanthropists.
